CHAP. V.

An ACT to divide the town of Brookfield, in the county of Chenango.

BE it enacted by the people of the state of New-York, represented in senate and assembly, That all that part of the town of Part of Brook-Brookfield, lying south of the eighteenth into a town by township, and comprehended in the seventeenth township, shall be and hereby is erected into a separate town by the name of Columbus; and that the first town-meeting shall be held at the dwelling-house of Jonathan Brownell in said town; and that all the remainder of the town of Brookfield shall be and remain a separate town by the name of Brookfield; and the first town. meeting shall be held where it now stands adjourned to in said town.

And be it further enacted, That as soon Poor and poor as may be after the first Tuesday of May money how to next, the supervisors and overseers of the poor of the aforesaid towns, on notice being previously given by said supervisors for that purpose, shall meet and divide the poor and money belonging to the said town of Brookfield previous to the division thereof, agreeable to the last tax list; and that each of the said towns shall forever thereafter respectively support their own poor.
